General items to keep in mind

► The consulate will provide you with a letter of authorization to get the exemption

- You MUST use a customs agent to get the exemption
 - ▶Even if you're doing the move yourself

Your inventory is critical, no matter how you're moving

- A comprehensive inventory will save you HOURS at customs if you're driving in... and avoid problems if you're shipping.
- Use "craigslist" value for your items

If you are moving yourself

When you need a customs broker

You must use a broker for duty-free importation (residency visas only)

- You must use a broker if the value of the items you're bringing in is over \$3,000
 - ▶ Tourism items (cameras, luggage, laptops, etc) do not count against the \$3,000 limit, and are never taxed.

Importation of household, Duty Free Is "Free" worth it?

➤ You'll get a \$1,000 exemption for your "dutyable" items, so your \$3,000 shipment is taxed at \$2,000.

▶ \$2,000 times 16% is \$320. Less than the broker's fee and without the coordination issues.

If you're bringing less than \$3k (craigslist value) just drive it in...

(works for non-residents, too)

You can drive your car or truck into Mexico, with a vehicle import permit

 Available for tourist entries and temporary residents (not permanent residents or citizens)

Car Permits

You can drive your car or truck into Mexico, with a vehicle import permit

- Available for tourist entries and temporary residents (not permanent residents or citizens)
- ▶ Temporary Residents: Either stop at border or go to consulate
- ▶ Non-residents can use the border station, or get them in advance online at https://www.banjercito.com.mx/registroVehiculos/

Tips and tricks


- ▶ Weigh your loaded vehicle prior to entry, if possible
 - ▶It'll help if you're suspected of being overweight

Show your inventory to the inspectors right away, before offloading anything

▶ Do not attempt to sneak through the "nothing to declare" line (unless you have no household items at all).



Clearing customs

▶ Go to witness your inspection, if possible

Delays at the port incur container charges (for sea shipments)

The extra costs (sea shipments)



- ► Always insist on unpacking (statement in dispute)
